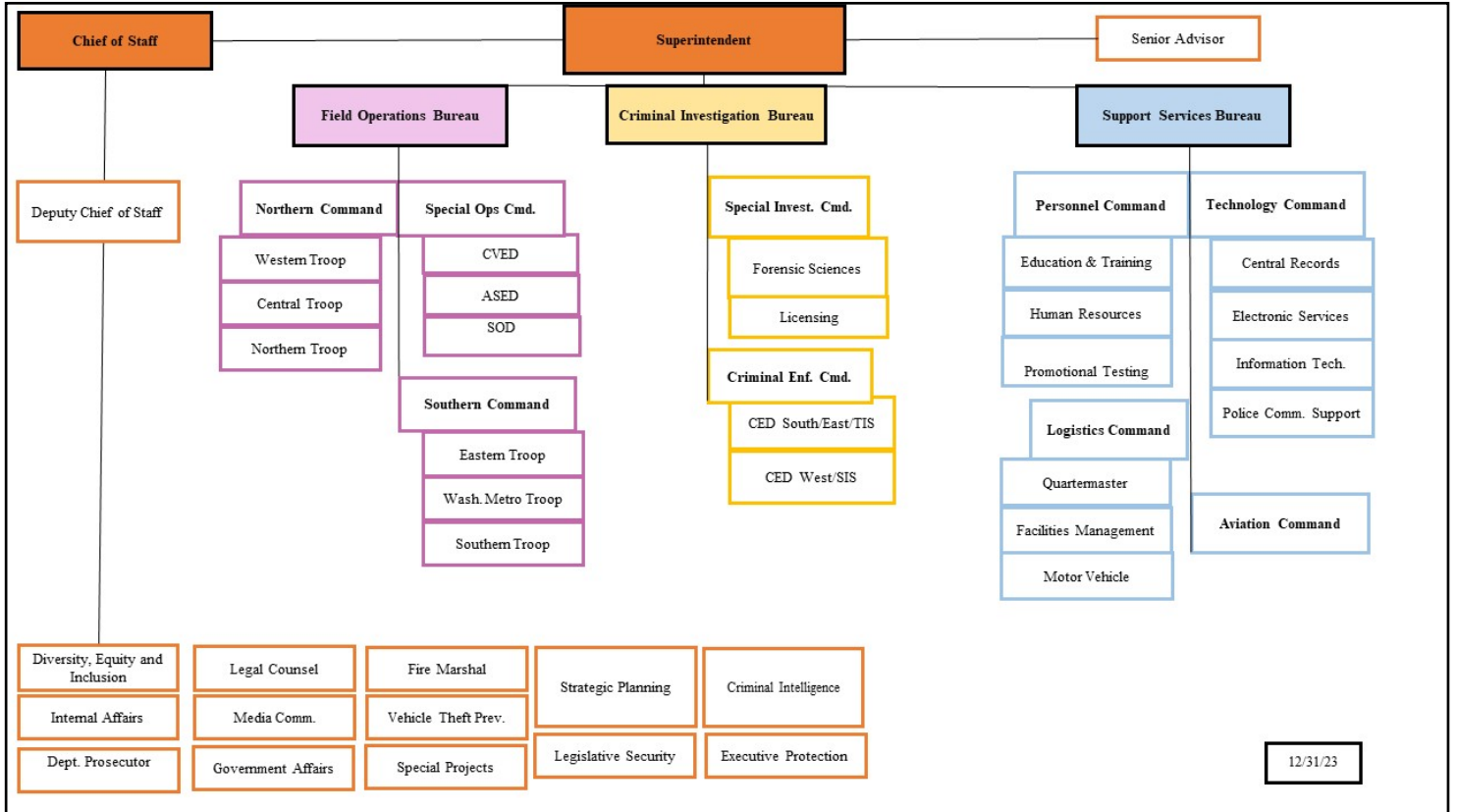

Allegany County

Served by the Cumberland Barrack



- In April, troopers were notified that a suspect in a stabbing case was in the Cumberland area. Troopers located the suspect in a vehicle, but the vehicle occupants fled. Troopers were able to find and arrest all the fleeing suspects.

Firearms and controlled dangerous substances (CDS) were located, and the suspects were charged accordingly.



In December, the Boy Scouts of Laurel Highlands Council visited with a Cumberland Barrack trooper.

- In April, the Homicide Unit investigated a homicide inside of the Western Correctional Institute, in which the victim was located with trauma to the body. Through investigation, a suspect was indicted on multiple charges, including murder.

- In August, Cumberland Barrack troopers were notified of a suspect at a local bank attempting to cash several large checks. Upon investigation, troopers discovered a complex identity fraud scheme that was traced back to

multiple jurisdictions along the East Coast. The case was taken over by federal authorities due to the amount of monetary theft sustained by several financial institutions.

- In September, troopers were notified of a stabbing at a local restaurant. Upon investigation, troopers were able to identify and arrest a suspect. In addition, troopers provided medical care to the wounded victim.

Anne Arundel County

Served by the Annapolis and Glen Burnie Barracks

- In March, members of the Metropolitan Area Drug Task Force and the Pro-Active Criminal Enforcement (PACE) team developed information that led to PACE conducting a directed traffic stop. Intercepted during the traffic stop were marijuana and marijuana related controlled dangerous substances (CDS) with a combined weight of 464.8 pounds and a combined street value of \$2.1 million. During the investigation, one arrest was made.
- In March, members of the Delivery System Parcel Interdiction Initiative intercepted 10,500 fentanyl tablets. During an investigation, a search and seizure warrant was served on a residence in Glen Burnie. One arrest was made and a firearm was seized.
- In March, Maryland State Apprehension Team troopers arrested a fugitive with six open arrest warrants from the Baltimore Police Department and the Anne Arundel Police Department. A search incident to arrest revealed a firearm and drugs packaged for sale. The fugitive was additionally charged with firearm and drug charges.
- In December, Annapolis Barrack troopers received an alert regarding a vehicle travelling

westbound in the eastbound lanes of Route 50. Trooper Alvarado initiated a traffic stop and detected the odor of an alcoholic beverage. After field sobriety testing, the suspect was arrested for DUI. In addition, a firearm was observed in plain view. The suspect was charged accordingly.

Baltimore City

Served by Specialized Units

- In February, Maryland State Apprehension Team (MSAT) troopers arrested a fugitive with ten open arrest warrants from the Baltimore Police Department and the Anne Arundel County Police Department. The fugitive's charges included attempted murder, home invasion and felony assaults. During the arrest attempt, the fugitive barricaded himself inside of a residence. After a short period of time, with the assistance of the Baltimore Police Department Special Weapons And Tactics (SWAT) team, the fugitive was arrested.



In December, troopers participated in Baltimore City's Kindertime Toy Drive, delivering holiday toys to patients at the Ronald McDonald House and Kennedy Krieger.



- Investigators discovered that a drug trafficking suspect and an accomplice were potential suspects in a May 2023 attempted first-degree murder. In collaboration with the Baltimore Police Department's Group Violence Reduction Unit, the suspects were linked to the crime, resulting in charges of first-degree murder and an additional 18 related charges being filed against both suspects.
- In May, MSAT troopers located and arrested two fugitives on open arrest warrants for murder and related charges. The charges were from the Allegany County Sheriff's Office for a shooting that occurred at Frostburg State University, where five victims were shot and one victim was killed. One suspect was arrested in Baltimore City and one was arrested in Harford County. During the arrest in Baltimore City, a firearm believed to have been used during the shooting was located. During the Harford County arrest, the vehicle believed to have been used during the shooting was located. The fugitives were charged accordingly.
- In August, members of the Delivery System Parcel Interdiction Initiative intercepted a total of 6.8 kilograms of cocaine. During the course of the investigation, a search and seizure warrant was served on a residence in Baltimore City. Additional items seized included 48.6 grams of heroin, 31.1 grams of fentanyl and a firearm. A suspect, who was prohibited from possessing firearms, was arrested and charged accordingly.



Baltimore County

Served by the Golden Ring and JFK Memorial Highway Barracks



In February, Cpl. Burton, M/Tpr. Johnson, Cpl. Hirsch and K-9 Pascal visited with children at St John's Lutheran School in Glen Arm.

- In April, JFK Highway Barrack troopers were alerted by the Roselle Police Department in New Jersey regarding a vehicle they were actively tracking for a homicide investigation. Troopers located the vehicle and conducted a felony traffic stop in Baltimore County. The driver was apprehended and charged accordingly.
- In April, a Golden Ring Barrack trooper overheard a Baltimore County Police Department dispatch for a shooting and located the suspect vehicle. The vehicle operator fled, but the trooper held a perimeter and guided additional units and allied agencies. The trooper then observed the suspect hiding in brush, leading to a successful arrest.
- In October, following a report of gunfire on Interstate 95, a suspect vehicle was identified by the victim. Allied agencies located the suspect vehicle in Essex, and JFK Highway Barrack troopers conducted a felony traffic stop. A subsequent search revealed two

firearms and ammunition, and the suspect was arrested and charged accordingly.

- In November, a Golden Ring Barrack trooper initiated a traffic stop on a speeding vehicle. Upon contact with the driver, the odor of marijuana was detected. A probable cause search revealed a firearm, 390 grams of marijuana, 15 grams of psilocybin mushrooms, a digital scale, drug packaging materials and \$5,992. The driver was arrested and charged accordingly.

Calvert County

Served by the Prince Frederick Barrack

- In March, a trooper initiated a traffic stop in Dunkirk for an equipment violation and detected the odor of marijuana. A probable cause search was conducted, and a firearm, ammunition and crack cocaine packaged for distribution were discovered. Both vehicle occupants were arrested and charged accordingly.

- In September, TFC Smith and TFC Whitman responded to an address in Prince Frederick for a domestic complaint. An investigation revealed that after an escalating argument, a mother strangled her minor daughter, causing visible injuries to the neck area. Medical services were requested to evaluate the juvenile, while the mother was arrested for first- and second-degree assault, reckless endangerment and child abuse. In addition, Child Protective Services was notified.



In August, Tpr. Collins and TFC Kelly celebrated National Night Out in Oakland Hall.

- In October, Cpl. Oleksak responded to a call at a residence in Lusby. An investigation revealed that a husband strangled his wife during an argument, leaving visible signs of injury on the wife's neck. While medical services evaluated the victim, the suspect was placed under arrest for domestic assault, charged with first- and second-degree assault.

- In October, a domestic complaint was received from a residence in Lusby. An investigation revealed that during the course of a verbal domestic incident, a firearm was brandished by a suspect. The firearm was located in plain view at the residence and was reported to be stolen. An additional firearm with an obliterated serial number was also located. The suspect was arrested and charged with reckless endangerment as well as several firearm related charges.

Caroline County

Served by the Easton Barrack



In August, TFC Fisher, D/Sgt. Williams, TFC Hansley and TFC Benson celebrated National Night Out with children at Martin Sutton Park in Ridgely.

- In January, Tpr. Black conducted a traffic stop which resulted in a warrant arrest and the seizure of fentanyl, cocaine and currency. Further investigation revealed the suspect possessed additional identification cards not belonging to him. One of the identification cards belonged to a victim in a Baltimore City homicide. The Baltimore City Homicide Unit was informed of the suspect's arrest.
- In February, the Easton Barrack received a report of an armed robbery. Troopers contacted the victim, who stated that two suspects

pointed guns at him and stole his cell phone. The victim was able to identify one of the suspects. Troopers contacted the Federalsburg Police Department, who was familiar with that suspect and set up surveillance on the suspect's residence. The surveillance showed a suspect vehicle and two suspects arriving at the residence. The suspects then fled behind the residence to an unknown location. Easton Barrack troopers conducted a consent search of the vehicle and residence, recovering two handguns, a face mask and two cell phones. The suspects were subsequently located and charged.

- In July, Easton Barrack troopers were dispatched to Preston for the report of a dispute between neighbors. The complainant advised that the suspect made threatening statements and was heard firing weapons on his property. Troopers responding to the suspect's residence heard several gunshots upon their approach. Troopers obtained cover and began giving verbal commands to the suspect. The suspect subsequently surrendered and was arrested for reckless endangerment. The suspect's mother provided consent to search the residence, resulting in the seizure of 19 firearms and several boxes of ammunition.

Carroll County

Served by the Westminster Barrack

- In February, Westminster Barrack troopers responded to Taneytown for two citizens suffering from gunshot wounds. The injured citizens were transported by medevac to a local hospital for medical treatment. Subsequent to the investigation, one of the citizens was charged with attempted murder.
- In June, troopers initiated a joint investigation, in collaboration with the Pennsylvania State Police and the Federal Bureau of Investigation, targeting a suspect distributing dangerous substances (CDS) in Maryland and Pennsylvania.



In July, the 26th annual Camp COPS (Courage to be Outstanding with Pride and Self-confidence) was held in Westminster.

During the investigation, it was revealed that the suspect was involved in trafficking cocaine, crack cocaine, fentanyl and crystal methamphetamine. A federal arrest warrant was issued and the suspect was located and arrested in Baltimore City. The collaborative

efforts between multiple law enforcement agencies underscored the commitment to combatting cross-border drug trafficking.

- In August, after a significant storm that caused catastrophic damage in Carroll County, troopers responded to Route 140 between Gorsuch Road and Market Street for assistance. The storm had snapped electrical poles and lines, which caused multiple citizens to become trapped in their vehicles, with current still flowing through the lines. The de-energizing process took approximately six hours to conduct safely. During this

process, troopers went vehicle to vehicle, risking their own safety, to communicate with entrapped citizens. Troopers provided medical assistance, water and resources to those trapped, until all 33 adults and 14 children were able to be rescued.

Cecil County

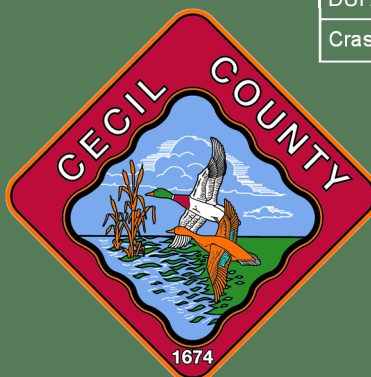
Served by the North East and JFK Memorial Highway Barracks

- In February, a trooper conducted a traffic stop on Pulaski Highway in North East. Upon contact, the trooper discovered multiple syringes and wax folds in plain view. A probable cause search yielded additional paraphernalia and a large amount of fentanyl.
- In May, the Cecil County Drug Task Force worked in collaboration with the Harford County Drug Task Force to serve multiple search and seizure warrants. The warrants stemmed from an investigation into a suspect distributing fentanyl throughout Cecil County. The warrants led to the seizure of several pounds of cocaine, crack cocaine, heroin/fentanyl and psilocybin, as well as 12 firearms and \$35,217. The coordinated operation resulted in the arrest and criminal charges of 11 suspects involved in drug distribution.
- In August, Strategic Operations Group investigators served a search and seizure warrant in Elkton on a suspect and a residence. The search yielded more than 100 grams of heroin/fentanyl, over 55 grams of crystal methamphetamine, 44 grams of cocaine, 72 grams of psilocybin, 163 grams of marijuana, prescription pills and two firearms. The suspect was arrested and charged accordingly, dismantling the drug trafficking organization.
- In September, troopers responded to a residence in Chesapeake City for a reported stabbing. Upon arrival, troopers found a victim with multiple lacerations to his face and arm. The suspect was located in the residence and was arrested for first-degree assault.

Charles County

Served by the La Plata Barrack

- In April, a La Plata Barrack trooper was patrolling in Waldorf when he observed a vehicle swerving all over a roadway. The trooper conducted a traffic stop and detected the odor of marijuana. A probable cause search revealed a firearm as well as 3.2 pounds of marijuana, 190 strips of Suboxone and drug paraphernalia. Both the driver and the passenger were placed under arrest and charged accordingly.
- In September, a La Plata Barrack trooper was patrolling in White Plains when he observed a vehicle commit a traffic violation. The trooper conducted a traffic stop and detected signs of alcohol impairment on the driver. The driver was subsequently arrested for DUI, and

investigation revealed that the driver had two open warrants for his arrest in Charles and Anne Arundel Counties. In addition, a search of the vehicle yielded a firearm and ammunition. The driver was charged accordingly.

- In November, an off-duty La Plata Barrack trooper in his personal vehicle observed an erratic driver in Hughesville. The suspect vehicle stopped, and the suspect driver brandished a spring assisted knuckle knife at the trooper. The suspect

driver then got back into his vehicle and drove until he was stopped by on-duty units. The suspect driver was found to be in possession of a spring assisted knuckle knife and was placed under arrest, charged with second-degree assault and possession of a concealed deadly weapon.

Dorchester County

Served by the Easton Barrack



In November, M/Tpr. Rola and MSP cadets posed at a recruiting event at Cambridge-South Dorchester High School.

- In March, Easton Barrack Group 5 conducted a criminal saturation patrol in Cambridge. The patrol yielded 31 traffic stops, resulting in 24 warnings, eight citations, one vehicle search, four Level 1 Department of Transportation inspections and one civil citation.
- In March, troopers from the Easton Barrack and allied agencies conducted a criminal enforcement initiative in Cambridge. The initiative yielded 25 traffic stops, resulting in 29 warnings, 16 citations, four safety equipment repair orders, three K-9 scans and four probable cause searches. There were also two criminal arrests, one from a seizure of cocaine.
- In April, Dorchester County Narcotics Task Force investigators were tasked with leading a multi-agency effort to address the gang and gun violence plaguing Cambridge. Investigators identified a group of individuals as having the propensity to commit criminal acts. Using investigative techniques, the group's activities involving the distribution of controlled dangerous substances (CDS) and firearms violations were tracked. As a result of the investigation, nine criminal felony indictments have been issued by the Dorchester County State's Attorney's Office, for charges including possession of CDS with intent to distribute, possession of firearms by prohibited persons and gang charges (Racketeer Influenced and Corrupt Organization).

Frederick County

Served by the Frederick Barrack



- In February, troopers were provided an alert regarding a shooting that had occurred in Montgomery County. Troopers located the suspect vehicle and conducted a high-risk traffic stop. A probable cause search revealed a firearm, controlled dangerous substances (CDS) and drug paraphernalia. The driver and the passenger were charged accordingly.
- In August, Sgt. Blubaugh helped save a driver's life. After a collision on Westbound Interstate 70 in Frederick County, the driver's vehicle caught on fire. Sgt. Blubaugh, along

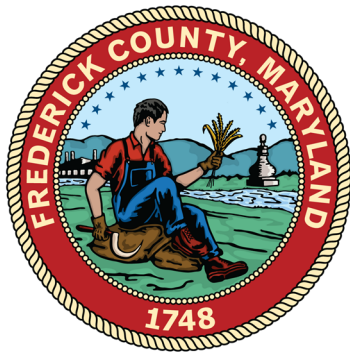

with multiple citizens, helped extract the driver from the burning vehicle. The driver was transported to a local hospital for further treatment.

- In August, troopers received an alert from the Fulton County (Ohio) Sheriff's Office, advising that a homicide suspect was currently driving on Interstate 70. Troopers

located the vehicle in Frederick County and attempted a high-risk traffic stop. The suspect driver fled, but troopers in pursuit were able to box in the suspect vehicle and forced the vehicle to stop. The suspect was placed under arrest, and evidence from the prior homicide was collected.

Garrett County

Served by the McHenry Barrack

- In January, TFC Hook conducted two separate traffic stops resulting in controlled dangerous substances (CDS) arrests. Sharing information with the Garrett County Sheriff's Office Drug Task Force, a search warrant was issued for a residence in Friendsville. Upon serving the search warrant, troopers seized cocaine, fentanyl and methamphetamines. Four suspects were arrested and charged with possession with intent to distribute.

- In April, TFC Poland conducted a traffic stop in Grantsville. Upon observing signs of criminal activity, a K-9 scan was performed. A positive alert led to a search of the vehicle. CDS was located, as well as four suspicious checks totaling \$11,851. Upon further investigation, it was discovered that the checks had been stolen and fraudulently cashed in the suspect's

name. The suspect was subsequently charged with fraud.

- In May, McHenry Barrack troopers conducted a traffic stop. Upon observing criminal indicators, a K-9 scan was performed with a positive alert. A subsequent search of the vehicle led to the discovery and seizure of 333 grams of heroin, 97 grams of cocaine and 21 grams of crack cocaine.

- In October, McHenry Barrack troopers provided assistance to the Pennsylvania State Police, who were in pursuit of a suspect with outstanding warrants operating a stolen vehicle. Troopers deployed stop sticks, disabling the vehicle. The suspect then attempted to flee on foot, but troopers were able to successfully apprehend the suspect.

Harford County

Served by the Bel Air and JFK Memorial Highway Barracks



In February, Tpr. Thoren visited with Girl Scouts at the Fallston United Methodist Church.

- In January, investigators responded to a report of an armed robbery in Edgewood. Upon investigation, it was discovered that the initial victim was actually the perpetrator of the robbery. Further findings revealed that a second suspect was involved in carrying out the crime. After establishing probable cause, two arrest warrants were issued for the identified suspects. Both suspects ultimately pled guilty to charges of robbery and

conspiracy to commit robbery.

- In February, Bel Air Barrack troopers responded to the report of a suspect pointing a firearm at vehicles and pedestrians in Street. When troopers attempted to contact the suspect at his nearby residence, the incident escalated into a barricade situation. Troopers established a perimeter and requested the assistance of the STATE team and the Criminal Enforcement Division (CED). The STATE team was able to apprehend the suspect, and the CED obtained a search warrant.
- In February, a suspect shot two Baltimore County police officers, stole the second officer's police vehicle and fled. A vehicle pursuit ensued from Baltimore County into Harford County. Bel Air troopers responded to assist. The suspect then abandoned the vehicle and fled on foot. Troopers coordinated with allied agencies to establish a perimeter and evacuated residents close to the suspect's location. The suspect was subsequently arrested.
- In March, JFK Barrack troopers were alerted by the Delaware State Police about a stolen vehicle that was entering Maryland on Interstate 95. Troopers located the vehicle and conducted a felony traffic stop. The driver was apprehended and charged accordingly.

Howard County

Served by the Waterloo Barrack

- In September, the Waterloo Barrack received a call regarding a vehicle being driven erratically on Interstate 70, then a call that the vehicle had collided with a guardrail. Upon a trooper's arrival on the scene, the driver was unresponsive. One dose of Narcan was administered, and the driver regained alertness. The driver was found to be driving under the influence and was subsequently transported to a local hospital for further treatment. In addition, a bag of heroin was discovered in plain view. The driver was charged accordingly.

Sixty capsules of heroin, 10 capsules of crack cocaine and paraphernalia were recovered. The passenger also had an active warrant through Frederick County for controlled dangerous substances (CDS) possession. The driver and the passenger were charged accordingly.
- In November, a Waterloo Barrack trooper conducted a traffic stop for a traffic violation.



In August, TFC Luers celebrated National Night Out in Columbia.

Upon establishing reasonable articulable suspicion, the trooper requested a K-9 scan. A positive alert and the subsequent search revealed the driver was in possession of 102.5 grams of cocaine, five capsules of heroin/fentanyl and paraphernalia. In addition, the passenger was in possession of heroin/fentanyl capsules, 7.8 grams of cocaine and paraphernalia. Both the driver and the passenger were arrested and charged accordingly.

- In March, the Kent County Narcotics Task Force, comprised of MSP troopers and allied agencies, conducted a court-approved search and seizure operation at a residence in Worton. Heroin/fentanyl, cocaine, paraphernalia, ammunition and currency were seized. A suspect was apprehended and charged with possession with intent to distribute (PWID) controlled dangerous substances (CDS).
- In July, TFC Emerson responded to assist with a reported overdose in Chestertown. The victim was suffering from cardiac arrest, and TFC Emerson, along with allied agencies, provided CPR and other aid until EMS arrived. Their actions helped save the life of the victim, and TFC Emerson was presented a life-saving award by the Chestertown Police Department.
- In July, S/Tpr. Nickerson responded to a reported hit and run accident. The suspect driver was located east of the accident scene. Search incident to arrest revealed 378.3 grams of marijuana, 42.8 grams of cocaine, 66.3 grams of methamphetamine, paraphernalia and currency. The suspect was charged for failing to remain on the scene of the accident, driving suspended and revoked and PWID. The suspect also had an outstanding warrant through Cecil County on drug-related charges.
- In September, TFC Graef ran a registration

Served by the Rockville Barrack

- In April, TFC Barnes conducted a traffic stop on a vehicle on Interstate 270 for a traffic violation. After detecting the odor of marijuana, TFC Barnes initiated a probable cause search. The search revealed a firearm, possession with intent to distribute (PWID) amounts of marijuana, fentanyl, heroin and drug distribution paraphernalia. In addition, the suspect driver was prohibited from possessing a firearm. TFC Barnes arrested the driver and charged him accordingly.
- In May, investigators developed information about a suspect distributing fentanyl in Silver Spring. Using investigative techniques, several undercover controlled purchases were made. Probable cause was developed for an arrest

warrant for the suspect and a search warrant for a residence. The suspect was arrested, and the search yielded the recovery of additional fentanyl and \$25,000.



In July, TFC Canizalez and Cpl. Butler were recognized by the Gaithersburg-Germantown Chamber of Commerce for community engagement, criminal enforcement and removing impaired drivers from the roads, pictured with Lt. Upole and Capt. Garcia.

- In October, TFC Seidl responded to a hit and run collision on Interstate 270. Upon investigation, it was learned that the suspect rammed the victim's car, then assaulted her by striking her head against a concrete barrier and stealing her cell phone and wallet. TFC Seidl tracked the suspect's vehicle down to a business in Virginia and was able to identify a suspect. A photo lineup was presented to the victim, and the victim positively identified the suspect. TFC Seidl applied for and received a warrant for assault, theft, traffic charges and robbery. The suspect was arrested and charged accordingly.

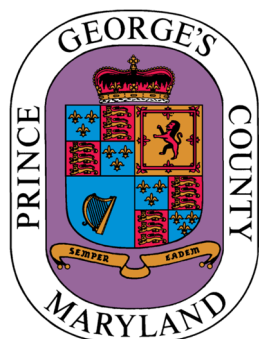
Prince George's County

Served by the College Park and Forestville Barracks



In August, Governor Moore greeted troopers at National Night Out in New Carrollton.

- In February, College Park Barrack troopers responded to a report of a shooting. Upon investigation, it was learned that the victim and the suspect were travelling on Interstate 495 when a verbal domestic altercation turned physical. The victim stopped on the roadway to separate and drive away from the suspect, but the suspect fired multiple rounds from a firearm and fled. The victim was uninjured, but the victim's vehicle was struck several times, causing significant damage. The suspect was identified, and troopers applied for and received an arrest warrant for the suspect. The suspect was subsequently arrested and charged accordingly, and the firearm used in the shooting was recovered.
- In May, a suspect kidnapped a victim in Washington, DC using a truck. The College Park Barrack subsequently received multiple calls reporting a truck driving erratically in Lanham. The truck was located and, after a short pursuit, became disabled in a ditch. Upon contact, troopers recovered the victim and placed the suspect driver under arrest. The suspect was charged accordingly.
- In September, Maryland State Apprehension Team troopers arrested a fugitive on several open arrest warrants from the Baltimore Police Department. The fugitive was wanted in connection with several separate homicides, rapes and related offenses that occurred during the span of a few weeks. The arrest occurred at a public transportation station in Prince George's County, with the assistance of the Prince George's County Police Department SWAT team.
- In November, College Park Barrack troopers initiated an armed carjacking investigation. Troopers located the victim's vehicle in Montgomery County, after it was involved in a collision. Allied law enforcement located the suspect driver in the area of the collision. The suspect was arrested, and a search incident to arrest revealed cocaine and ammunition. The suspect was charged accordingly.

- In February, the Queen Anne's County Drug Task Force, comprised of MSP troopers and allied agencies, served search and seizure warrants at a suspect's residence in Grasonville. An investigation had begun in late 2022, when the task force received intelligence about the suspect selling heroin and cocaine in the area.



In December, Centreville Barrack's Sgt. Connolly participated in Shop With A Hero in Stevensville.

The search revealed substantial amounts of cocaine, drug distribution paraphernalia and \$20,000. The suspect was charged accordingly.

- In February, TFC Mulhearn conducted a traffic stop for an equipment violation. Upon contact with the operator, TFC Mulhearn detected marijuana. A probable cause search revealed three firearms, 55.1 grams of marijuana, various forms of THC and psilocybin and currency. The operator was prohibited from

possessing firearms, and one of the firearms was confirmed as stolen. The operator was charged with possession with intent to distribute (PWID), additional firearm charges and driving without a license.

- In March, Tpr. Pettitt performed a traffic stop for a traffic violation. Upon contact with the occupants, the odor of marijuana was detected. A probable cause search revealed 3.33 pounds of

marijuana, cocaine, multiple boxes of THC oil and \$6,729. Both occupants were arrested and charged with PWID.

- In March, Tpr. Pettitt initiated a traffic stop for an equipment violation. Upon detecting the odor of marijuana, a probable cause search was performed. The search revealed 88.1 grams of marijuana, two firearms and currency. The operator was arrested and charged with PWID.

The victim was ultimately pronounced deceased, and the suspect was charged for murder.

Served by the Leonardtown Barrack



In August, Leonardtown Barrack troopers posed with children during the Back To School Shop With A Cop event.

- In January, troopers investigated a murder in St. Mary's County, which had originally started as a missing person investigation. During the investigation, the Homicide Unit made two arrests and obtained key evidence.
- In January, troopers responded to a report of shots fired in Great Mills. Upon investigation, troopers determined a suspect had argued with a victim. During the argument, the suspect entered a residence and retrieved a firearm. The suspect fired one round at the victim, then fled. Troopers applied for an arrest warrant for the suspect and secured a search warrant for the suspect's residence

and vehicle. The suspect was located, and a search of the residence resulted in the recovery of several firearms and ammunition, including a firearm matching the description of the one used in commission of the crime. The suspect was charged accordingly.

- In February, troopers investigated an assault in Lexington Park. Upon arrival, troopers found a victim suffering from life-threatening stab wounds. Troopers used evidence on the scene and video surveillance from the housing complex to identify a suspect. The suspect had an outstanding warrant for attempted second-degree murder. Troopers developed the suspect's location, and a search warrant was obtained and served by the STATE team. The suspect was charged with attempted first-degree murder.
- In August, the Leonardtown Barrack joined the State's Attorney's Office and the St. Mary's County Sheriff's Office to implement a multi-agency initiative called "Slow Down St. Mary's." The initiative planned to address traffic-related fatalities and focus on speeding, distracted driving and aggressive driving. The initiative ran from August through October, and the following statistics were achieved: 3,382 traffic stops, 3,847 citations, 647 warnings and 149 safety equipment repair orders (SEROs).

Talbot County

Served by the Easton Barrack

- In June, members of the Talbot County Drug Task Force, assisted by allied agencies, served a total of 15 search and seizure warrants upon residences and vehicles in Talbot, Dorchester, Caroline and Queen Anne's Counties. This was in relation to a year-long combined law enforcement investigation into a suspect and a drug trafficking organization (DTO). The searches led to the following seizures: 1,377 grams of cocaine, heroin/fentanyl, seven vehicles, two firearms and \$111,826. As a result of the investigation, eight suspects were arrested. The accused kingpin was charged with importing large quantities of illegal drugs, which co-conspirators assisted in selling and distributing.



In August, M/Tpr. Rola celebrated National Night Out with youth at Molton Park in Easton.

- In August, troopers received multiple calls about a vehicle being operated recklessly on Ocean Gateway. Troopers located the vehicle and conducted a traffic stop. Upon contact with the driver, there was suspicion of impairment. Following field sobriety testing, the driver was arrested for DUI. Search incident to arrest revealed a firearm and controlled dangerous substances (CDS). The driver was charged accordingly.

- In October, a plane attempting to take off from the Easton Airport experienced unknown issues, which caused it to crash at the end of the runway. The pilot experienced non-life threatening injuries and was flown by MSP Aviation for medical treatment.

- In February, troopers assigned to the Maryland State Apprehension Team apprehended a suspect on three open warrants, for three counts of attempted murder and related crimes. The arrest occurred in Hagerstown, with the assistance of the STATE team.

- In March, M/Tpr. Thompson conducted a traffic stop on a vehicle. Upon initiating a K-9 scan and receiving a positive alert, M/Tpr. Thompson conducted a search of the vehicle. The search revealed 479 grams of crack cocaine and 166 grams of fentanyl. The driver was charged accordingly.
- In September, TFC Doyle initiated a traffic stop and found the driver was suspended. After recognizing criminal indicators, a K-9 scan was conducted, with a positive alert. A search revealed 521 grams of marijuana and \$5,000,

and the driver was charged accordingly. After working with the Western Maryland Drug Task Force, this traffic stop enabled a search and seizure warrant to be served on a residence known for drug activity. This resulted in the seizure of 350 grams of cocaine, 77 grams of fentanyl, nine grams of crystal methamphetamine and nine pounds of marijuana. In addition, two firearms and ammunition were seized. Two suspects were arrested, found

to be prohibited from possessing firearms and charged accordingly.

- In November, a Washington County judge was murdered. The suspect's vehicle was subsequently located in Williamsport. Troopers assisted with securing the perimeter and the search of the area. The suspect was found deceased.

The victim escaped and was transported to a local hospital for medical care. The victim's vehicle was located in Salisbury. Upon troopers approaching the victim's vehicle, the suspect fled. After a brief foot chase, the suspect was arrested and charged accordingly.
- In March, Maryland State Apprehension Team troopers arrested a fugitive with an open arrest warrant for attempted murder and related crimes. The fugitive was located at a residence in Salisbury, inside an air duct. An occupant of the residence was charged with harboring a fugitive.
- In April, the Salisbury Barrack was notified of an armed robbery at a store in Pittsville. The suspect had displayed a firearm in the commission of the robbery. Troopers

responding to the area were able to locate and apprehend the suspect. The firearm and the stolen cash were recovered, and the suspect was charged accordingly.

After a lengthy investigation, investigators charged two suspects with the homicide. Investigators also made additional arrests of other involved suspects. In total, the Homicide Unit authored 28 search warrants and made three arrests.

- In April, TFC Kreiling conducted a traffic stop. Upon contact with the driver, the odor of marijuana was detected. A probable cause search of the vehicle revealed 73 fentanyl pills, 55 grams of ketamine, oxycodone and drug paraphernalia. TFC Kreiling also

determined that the driver had several active arrest warrants. The driver was charged accordingly.

- In May, S/Tpr. Woo conducted a traffic stop for speeding and detected the odor of alcohol, as well as signs of impairment from the driver. A pat down revealed a bag of cocaine. A probable cause search revealed a firearm and \$5,190. The driver performed field sobriety tests poorly and was subsequently placed under arrest and charged accordingly.
- In June, TFC Phillips conducted a traffic stop for speeding. Upon contact with the vehicle occupants, the odor of marijuana was detected. The vehicle occupants were removed from the vehicle and detained. Wanted checks were completed and found that the driver had an arrest warrant through the Prince George's County Police Department. A probable cause search revealed marijuana and a firearm. The driver claimed ownership of the firearm and the marijuana, and he was charged accordingly.

Forensic Sciences Division

- In April, MSP charged a suspect with 23 criminal charges following a felony drug and firearm investigation. In October 2022, MSP had conducted a crime suppression patrol in Elkton. A K-9 scan on an abandoned suspect vehicle resulted in a positive alert for controlled dangerous substances (CDS). A search led to the discovery of 222 bags of heroin/fentanyl, 35 grams of cocaine, 32 grams of crack cocaine, 291 grams of crystal methamphetamine, drug packaging material, digital scales and a firearm. Investigators received a National Integrated Ballistic Information Network (NIBIN) lead from the Forensic Sciences Division (FSD) Firearms/Toolmarks Unit related to the recovered firearm. The firearm was involved in a shooting in New Castle County, Delaware, which led to the suspect's arrest by New Castle County detectives. DNA samples from the suspect

were sent to FSD's Biology Section for analysis, which resulted in sufficient evidence for the suspect to be charged with multiple crimes.

- During 2023, FSD's Firearms/Toolmark Unit determined the casings recovered from the scene of a December 2022 homicide in Dorchester County were consistent with the firearm recovered from a suspect. In addition, FSD's Latent Prints/Impressions Unit discovered a print from the crime scene identified to the suspect. The suspect was charged accordingly.



In February, Lt. Governor Miller visited FSD for the International Day of Women in Science.

- In August, a homicide victim's body was discovered in Bel Air. Swabs from the crime scene were reviewed by the FSD Biology Section. A profile was developed and submitted to the Combined DNA Index System (CODIS). A national search revealed a match to a Los Angeles Police Department burglary case.



In July, the Republic of the Philippines National Police delegation visited the FSD lab.



Aviation Command

- The MSP Aviation Command (MSPAC) completed 1,916 medevacs, responded to 141 law enforcement missions, assisted with the arrest of 30 suspects, flew 174 search and rescue missions and completed 18 hoist/aerial rescue operations. The MSPAC logged more than 2,760 flight hours in support of the Department's missions.
- The MSP Unmanned Aircraft Systems (UAS) Team, comprised of MSPAC, Crash Team and Office of the State Fire Marshal personnel, conducted 429 UAS missions.
- In May, the MSPAC began carrying whole blood on its helicopters, instituting the first state-wide "Blood on Board" program of this type in the United States. The whole blood enables treatment of critically injured patients with significant blood loss prior to arriving at a trauma center.
- In May, Trooper 1 was instrumental in the swift apprehension of an armed rapist immediately following two assaults along the Northwest Branch Trail in Montgomery County. Coordination and communication between the aircraft and multiple ground units led to the



In August, Aviation Command celebrated a new "Blood on Board" collaboration with the Maryland Institute for Emergency Medical Services (MIEMSS) and University of Maryland Medical Center (UMMC).

successful apprehension.

- In May, Trooper 2 assisted with the pursuit of a suspect involved in a child abduction. The abducted child was in a vehicle with the suspect, who had rammed two patrol vehicles. Trooper 2 remained active in the pursuit until its conclusion, with the successful apprehension of the suspect and safe recovery of the child.

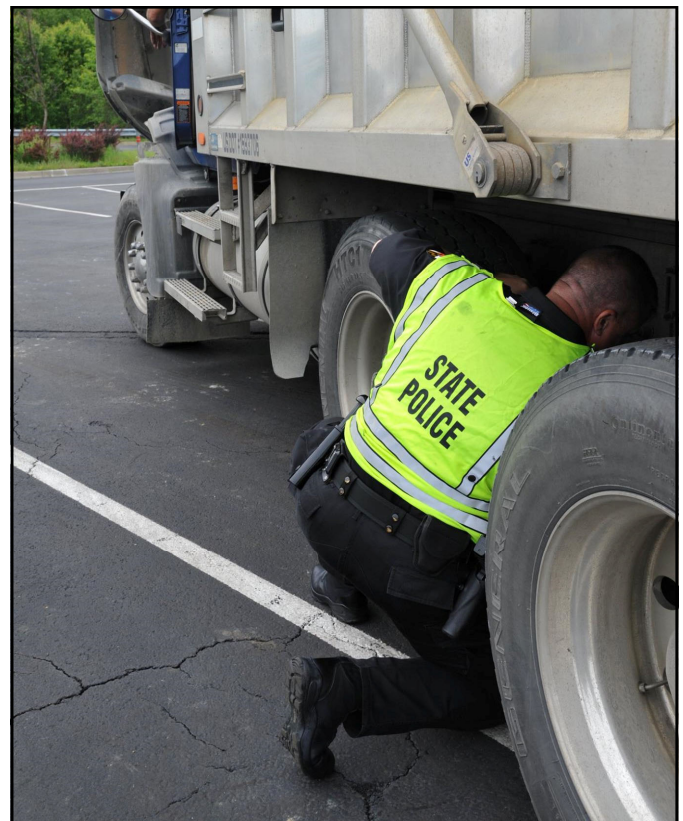


Commercial Vehicle Enforcement Division

- Commercial Vehicle Enforcement Division (CVED) personnel weighed approximately 1.1 million commercial vehicles, conducted 56,228 roadside inspections and issued 11,045 citations. In addition, 8,612 unsafe commercial vehicles and 3,668 unsafe or unqualified drivers were placed out of service.
- The Motor Carrier Safety Program completed its 56th year of operation in Maryland. Four state agencies, along with the MSP, participate in the program with the assistance of 22 allied agencies. MSP is the lead law enforcement agency in the program and is tasked with training and certifying all allied officers associated with the program.
- The Crash Team responded to 462 incidents, including 214 fatal collisions, 175 injury collisions, 41 cases for allied police departments, 20 Criminal Enforcement Division crime scenes, six departmental collisions and six investigations for the Attorney General Independent Investigations Division. Crash Team members were the lead investigators on 199 of the above incident responses.
- Chemical Test for Alcohol Unit (CTAU) personnel maintained calibrations and certification standards for its fleet of 108 evidential breath test instruments used by MSP and allied departments. CTAU processed 556 blood alcohol kits, and there were 14 court subpoenas for breath test records processed by the Unit.



The CVED is tasked with encouraging and promoting a safe driving environment through education and safety inspections, while enforcing state and federal laws.



Internal Affairs Division

- The Internal Affairs Division (IAD) is committed to ensuring the Department polices fairly and professionally and is responsible for investigating allegations of misconduct against troopers. The IAD maintains the integrity of the Department by thoroughly investigating complaints.
- The IAD uses BlueTeam software coupled with IPro software for direct data entry, which promotes seamless statistical analysis and expedites the investigative process. Troopers enter information in cases involving use of force,

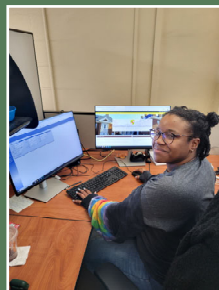


show of force, vehicle pursuits and firearm discharges, and supervisors enter data related to complaints from internal or external sources.

- The IAD oversaw the completion of 361 total cases, processing 191 citizen/external complaints and 170 internal complaints (including firearm discharge investigations). Of the 361 cases, 17 are pending adjudication.
- The IAD Force Review Unit (FRU) comprehensively reviews each use of force and show of force incident. The FRU reviewed 183 show of force and 436 use of force reports in 2023.

Licensing Division

- The Firearms Registration Unit processed 120,752 regulated firearms transactions in 2023, a 2% increase versus 2022. The Unit disapproved 588 applications, of which 486 denials were due to criminal related prohibitors.
- The Handgun Qualification License (HQL) Unit processed 44,186 new applications. The Unit disapproved 1,524 applicants, which is 3.5% of the total applications received. In addition, the HQL Unit processed 3,364 renewal applications.



Administrative Specialist III Sinclair Vinson entered data for the Firearms Registration Unit of the Licensing Division.

- The Handgun Permit Unit received 64,724 original applications and 13,682 renewal applications, for a combined total of 78,406 applications. The Unit disapproved 2,258 applications, which is 2.9% of the total applications submitted.
- The Administrative Investigation Unit completed 75,582 background investigations in 2023.
- “LiveHelp,” which assists applicants with online submissions on the Licensing Portal, answered 12,438 requests for assistance.

Office of the State Fire Marshal

- The Office of the State Fire Marshal (OSFM) responded to 831 fire and explosive incidents, resulting in an estimated \$67 million in property loss. In addition, the OSFM conducted 11,600 building inspections, verifying that field conditions are consistent with approved designs and required safety standards are maintained. Also, the OSFM completed 1,162 pre-construction plan reviews, evaluating building and systems designs for compliance with the State Fire Prevention Code.
- Throughout 2023, the OSFM Bomb Squad was responsible for explosive incidents and special events in Baltimore City, due to a city staff shortage. As a result, the Bomb Squad responded to seven emergency incidents and spent more than 165 manhours in Baltimore City.
- The OSFM began the distribution of their first Class “A” uniform and the development of the first-ever agency Honor Guard. The Honor Guard completed initial training and participated in several events.
- The OSFM received an ATF-certified (Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives) accelerant detection canine. The OSFM continues to lead the country in ATF-certified canines.
- The OSFM participated in more than 75 community events.



The OSFM investigated 831 incidents in 2023.
